

"WEST OF KABUL... EAST OF NEW YORK" ANSARY'S LETTER TO DUNYA

Abstract

This article is the first translation into Uzbek of an e-mail, that is, a letter written by the Afghan-American writer Mir Tamim Ansary to the entire Afghan people and the world after the events of September 11, 2001, in which the author on the scale, especially in the Western and Eastern regions (Afghanistan and America), his burning proposal to maintain peace and to prove that the Afghan people are not terrorists as the whole world thinks, but in fact, it is the work of Bin Laden and his supporters.

Introductory words: Afghanistan and its oppressed people, Bin Laden, the Taliban, the difference between the West and the East, the Stone Age, eating well, etc. by Mir Tamim Ansary the title of the novel is a very fast and easy running word, ... a book that can notice things that we don't pay attention to, but actually notices things that we need to notice. We have mentioned only some qualities about this novel by Mir Tamim Ansary. In fact, this is only a large (book 301 pages) prologue - introduction (pages 3-11)

Three parts: The first part (lost world) "The Lost World", the second "Looking for Islam" pages 101-119 and the third part "Forgetting Afghanistan" and pages 223-285. Its pages 289-292 contain Ansary's e- mail (we will also provide its translation) and the last pages 293-300 and a thank you note (page 301) to those who helped bring the book into the world.

As we read the introduction, we were surprised that some Americans assumed that Afghanistan was an "off the map, uncharted" place due to their ignorance.

On September 11, 2001, Afghanistan's Kandahar, Jerusalem and Mazar-e-Sharif, and on September 12, the name of Afghanistan has already entered the mouth of many people in a negative sense. On that day, Tamim Ansary said about Afghanistan, "Destroy that place with nuclear weapons. Let this be a lesson to those people. Surround it with a fence! Do not give them medical help, restrict them from food and pinch! Doom those people to starvation! calls were heard (p. 4)

SMS written on September 12, 2001

dear friends,

I have heard a lot of talk about going back to bombing Afghanistan to return it to its Stone Age state. In one radio interview, the host says that this means killing innocent people, that people have nothing to do with this brutality, but we are at war, "how much more damage can we take. What else can we do?'

A few minutes later, I heard Indian scholars on TV saying, "What can we do, do we have the stomach?" I heard the discussion. And I thought that because I'm from Afghanistan, there are some really tough issues to discuss, and even though I've lived here for thirty-five years, I 've lost track of what's going on back home. I didn't put it. That's why I want to tell anyone who wants to hear what I feel and see from where I am.

I speak as a hater of the Taliban and Osama Bin Laden. I have no doubt that these people are responsible for the atrocities in New York. I agree that something needs to be done about those creatures.

But Tolbans and Bin Ladens are not Afghanistan. They are not even representatives of the Afghan government. The Taliban in 1977 are ignorant, sick at heart, mentally ill with insanity, mercantilism, people who worship such illness. Bin Laden is a criminal with a political crime agenda. When you think Taliban, think Nazis. When you think Bin Laden, think Hitler. When you think "Afghan people" people, think "concentration camp fighters".

It was not only the Afghan people who faced this barbarity. They became the first victims of criminals. They would be happy and rejoicing when someone came here,

clearing the way for the Taliban and the rat nest, international bandits, thugs, clearing the way, some ask why the Afghans are rising up., that they will not throw out the Taliban? The answer is that they are hungry, naked, exhausted, oppressed, unable to do anything, suffering. A few years ago, the United Nations said that there are 500,000 orphans and widows in Afghanistan who are unable to work - the country has no economy, no food to eat. There are millions of widows. The Taliban are burying those poor widows alive in public cemeteries. The soil was turned into fields full of debris from the mines, and the farms were destroyed by the Soviets. These are some of the reasons why the Afghan people are unable to throw out the Taliban.

Now we come to the question of why Afghanistan was not bombed and turned into the Stone Age.

The Soviets caused these disasters, and they have already taken care of it.

Suffering Afghans? They have been suffering for a long time. To raze their houses to the ground? So it was done. Have their schools been turned into piles of rubble? So it was done. Should their hospitals be completely destroyed? This is done. Destroy their infrastructure? Depriving them of medicine and health care? It's too late. Someone has already done all of this.

New bombs just move piles of old bombs. Will they go to the head of the Taliban? No, apparently. In today's Afghanistan, only the Taliban eat, and only they have the means to move around. They run away and hide. Maybe the bombs will fall on those orphans who are deprived of their means because they can't move fast, they don't even have wheelchairs to give to the sick.

However, the bombing of Kabul would not have actually carried out those terrible atrocities. The fight against the criminals is actually a re-rape of the same people who have been raping the Taliban all along.

What else is there? What else can be done? Allow me to speak with genuine fear and trembling. Capturing bin Laden means going there with a base, base army. As people say, "you have to do what the stomach needs", they should kill as much as the stomach needs, to clean the stomach morally, to avoid doubt, hesitation, guilty conscience. Let's get our heads out of the sand, let's have something that kills Americans' stoma." Some Americans have been in Afghanistan fighting Bin Laden's hideout, which is much bigger than that. Because in order to enter Afghanistan, we have to pass through Pakistan. Will they allow us to pass? It's not like Unaka. For this, it is necessary to conquer Pakistan first. Will other Muslim nations agree to this? You know what I mean. Are we going to have a friendly war between Islam and the West for the world? Guess what it is. This is Bin Laden's program. That's exactly what he wants. That's why he did it. Read his speeches and statements. Everything is in place there. He



clearly believes that Islam will beat the West. It's ridiculous, worth nothing but a laugh. But he portrays the world as a man who divides the world into the poles of Islam and the West, who has billions of soldiers. If the West leaves them to their own devices, they will exterminate them. This means that billions of people will be destroyed. Bin Laden's theory is that their group will be wiped out, which is even better in Bin Laden's view.

He is perhaps, apparently, unjust; In the end, the West will win, no matter what happens, but the war will drag on for years, and millions will die, not only theirs, but ours as well.

Who needs a belly like that? to Bin Laden. Is it for everyone?
